8. There are internal choices in all the 6 marks questions.

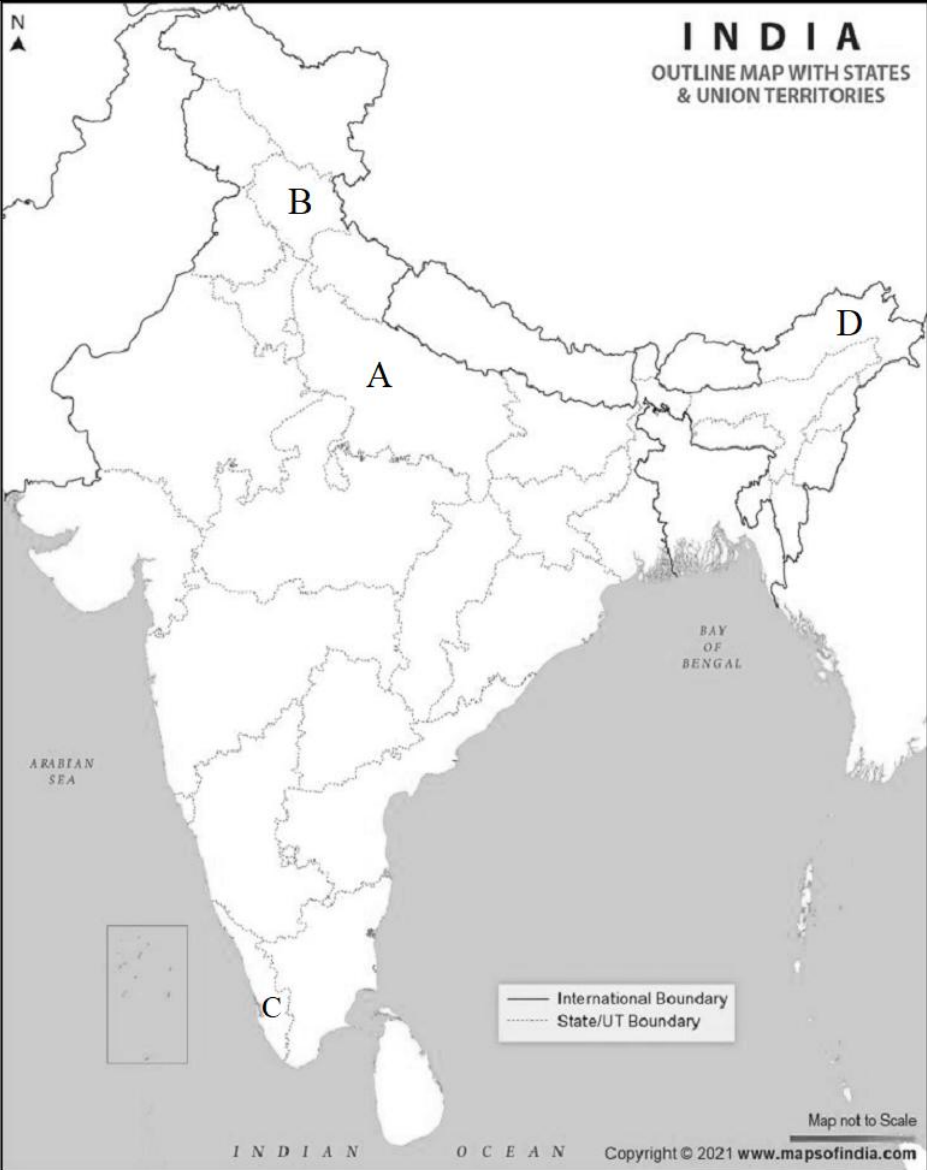
