- v. **Interference by European Powers:** Powerful nations such as Russia and Austria-Hungary supported different Balkan groups to promote their own interests, further weakening the Ottoman Empire.

2. Explain the Gandhi-Irwin Pact. Do you think it was a success? Give reasons.

Answer:

The **Gandhi-Irwin Pact** was signed on **5 March 1931** between Mahatma Gandhi and Lord Irwin. It temporarily ended the Civil Disobedience Movement and paved the way for discussions between the British Government and the Indian National Congress.

The main terms of the Pact were:

- i. It promised dominion status to India
- ii. The Congress agreed to suspend the Civil Disobedience Movement.
- iii. Gandhi agreed to participate in the Second Round Table Conference in London.

- iv. The British Government agreed to release political prisoners who had not committed violent crimes.

It was a partial success because:

- i. It led to the release of thousands of political prisoners.
 - ii. The Congress was recognized as a major political force and invited to negotiate with the British.
- However, the demand for Complete Independence was not accepted.

3. The Non-Cooperation Movement marked a turning point in India's freedom struggle."

Do you agree with this statement?

Evaluate its achievements and limitations to justify your answer.

Answer:

Yes, I agree that the Non-Cooperation Movement was a turning point in India's freedom struggle because it transformed the nature of the national movement.

Achievements:

- i. It was the first nationwide mass movement led by Mahatma Gandhi, involving people from different regions, religions, and social groups.
- ii. It encouraged Indians to boycott foreign goods, government schools, law courts, and titles, promoting the spirit of Swadeshi and self-reliance.
- iii. The movement increased political awareness and inspired ordinary people, including women, students, and peasants, to participate in the freedom struggle.

Limitations:

- iv. The movement was withdrawn after the Chauri Chaura incident, disappointing many supporters.
- v. It did not achieve its immediate objective of Swaraj (self-rule).
- vi. The sudden withdrawal created confusion among many freedom fighters.

However, despite its limitations, the Non-Cooperation Movement was a major turning point because it united millions of Indians under a common cause and laid the foundation for future mass movements.

4. Construct an explanation showing how different social groups participated in the **Civil Disobedience Movement** and explain how their expectations and objectives influenced their participation.

Answer:

Different social groups participated in the **Civil Disobedience Movement (1930)** with different expectations and objectives. Although they united under Mahatma Gandhi's leadership, each group hoped to achieve its own goals.

Rich Peasants: Rich farmers from Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh, and Andhra Pradesh wanted a reduction in land revenue and protection from economic hardships. They actively joined the movement hoping the government would lower taxes.

Poor Peasants: Poor peasants expected relief from high rents and wanted remission of unpaid rent. However, the Congress did not support their demand to stop rent payments, so many later withdrew from the movement.

Business Class: Indian industrialists and traders supported the movement because they wanted protection from foreign competition, lower taxes, and freedom to expand Indian industries.

Women: Women from both urban and rural areas took part in processions, picketing, and boycotts. They hoped to contribute to India's freedom and gain greater respect and participation in public.

5. What is industrialization? Examine the impact of British policies on India weavers.

Answer:

Industrialization is the process of developing industries on a large scale by using machines, factories, and modern technology to produce goods efficiently.

Impact of British Policies on Indian Weavers: British policies had a severe impact on Indian weavers:

- i. Cheap machine-made cloth from Britain flooded Indian markets, reducing the demand for hand woven Indian textiles.
- ii. Heavy taxes and restrictions were imposed on Indian textiles, while British goods entered India with low duties.
- iii. Many weavers lost their livelihood because they could not compete with cheaper factory-made products.
- iv. Weavers were often forced to sell cloth at very low prices to British traders.

As a result, many weaving families fell into poverty and shifted to agriculture or other low-paying jobs.

Explain how this system benefited both the merchants and the rural workers.

Answer:

- i. The powerful guilds in towns restricted merchants from expanding production, so merchants shifted production to the countryside.
- ii. Due to the enclosure movement, many poor peasants and cottagers lost access to common lands and looked for additional sources of income.
- iii. Merchants supplied raw wool to rural spinners, weavers, fullers, and dyers, while controlling every stage of production and marketing.
- iv. Rural families could continue farming on their small plots while earning extra income through cloth production, making full use of family labour.
- v. This proto-industrial system increased cloth production, benefited merchants by reducing costs and avoiding guild restrictions, and provided employment and supplementary income to rural households.

Arid soil is found mainly in the dry and desert regions of western India, especially Rajasthan and Gujarat. It is red to brown, sandy, and coarse in texture. The soil is porous, so it has low moisture-retaining capacity. It contains very little humus and nitrogen but is rich in mineral salts. A layer of calcium carbonate

(kankar) forms in the lower part of the soil, restricting water movement.

The main challenges are low fertility, poor moisture retention, scarce rainfall, and the hard kankar layer, which limits root growth. The soil is also prone to wind erosion. However, with proper irrigation, organic manure, fertilisers, and soil conservation measures, arid soil can be made suitable for agriculture.

13. Explain how different human activities lead to land degradation in India.

Suggest appropriate conservation measures to overcome these problems.

Answer:

The different human activities lead to land degradation in India.

- i. **Deforestation** removes vegetation cover, causing soil erosion.
- ii. **Overgrazing** exposes the soil, making it prone to erosion.
- iii. **Mining and quarrying** leave deep pits and damage the land.
- iv. **Excessive use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides** reduces soil fertility.
