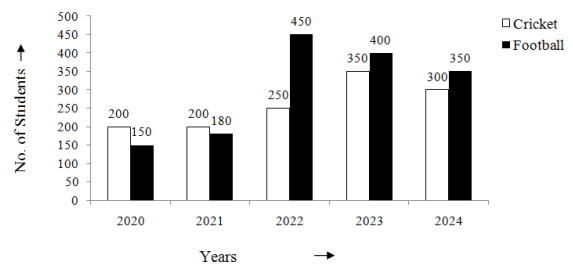

Trends in Student Preferences: Cricket vs. Football (2020–2024)

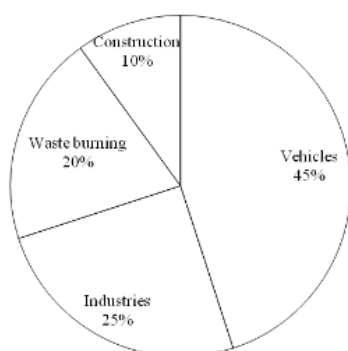

Because these alliances were built entirely on material gains rather than love, relationships lacked genuine understanding and respect. This underlying greed is exactly why Lomov and Natalya repeatedly descend into vicious, immature shouting matches over trivial matters like land ownership and hunting dogs, proving that their

society valued pride and possessions over human connection.

The play highlights the absurdity of human behaviour, showing how pride, greed, and ego can overpower reason and emotion. It satirically suggests that in such a society, marriage decisions are influenced more by property and social standing than by love or compatibility.

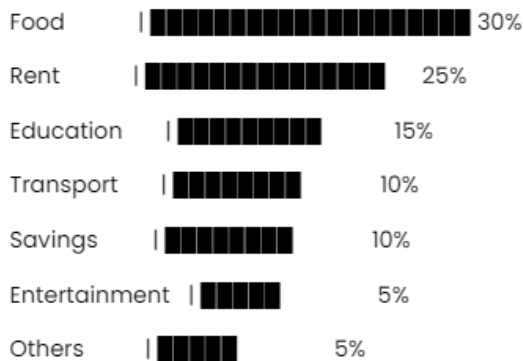

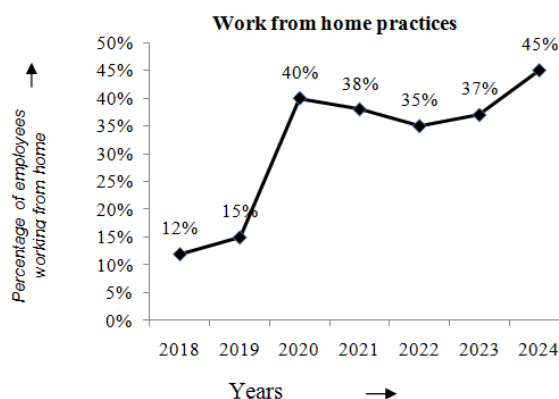
